serve on a committee that is looking at the impending predicament that the North American Division is dealing with in the shortage of pastors. Our various universities in the North American Division are graduating a shrinking

number of pastors (and teachers) to fill the void of our growing number of retirees. Right now, we graduate around 85 pastoral students from all our schools across the NAD. Currently on average we are retiring over 150 pastors each year and that number will soon sky rocket.

What does this mean for the Maritime Conference? It means that it will be increasingly difficult to fill the void as the gap between graduates and retirees grow. It also means that the Conferences which might have greater means in salary and also smaller districts will be able to attract our pastors in their direction. This is a reality that we are going to have to face in the very near future. It could even mean that some of our districts will grow to include 5 churches per pastor unless we send more of our youth to Burman to pursue a degree in Pastoral Ministries or Education.

There are a few things we must be moving towards in our small conference as this reality looms over our head. One, all our churches can become more lay-driven and less pastor dependant and, of course, this is easy to say but very difficult to carry out. Two, we can work more closely together with our sister churches in order to accomplish evangelism in our urban centers. Three, we can encourage and help out financially those who are hearing the call to ministry in teaching or pastoral ministries.

Part of the vision of our Board of Directors is to move our churches to be less pastor dependant. I have heard from many church members that they just want a pastor to preach a sermon in their church on Sabbath morning and to run prayer meeting. I believe, when I hear this, we are missing the mission that God has set our church apart for. Our mission is to seek and save the lost and somehow having a church service has supplanted the need to bring the Everlasting Gospel to the world. If we refocused and become more like our early church I believe this transition can take place to reach the lost. The early church met from house to house and many were added to their number daily.

Regard vers l'avenir

e fais partie d'un comité qui se penche sur la situation de pénurie de pasteurs à laquelle la Division de l'Amérique du Nord (NAD) est confrontée en ce moment. Nos diverses universités de la Division nord-américaine graduent un nombre décroissant de pasteurs (et d'enseignants) qui n'arrive pas à combler le vide laissé par le nombre croissant de retraités. À l'heure actuelle, nous diplômons environ 85 étudiants au pastorat dans l'ensemble de nos écoles à travers la Division (NAD). Actuellement, en moyenne, nous mettons à la retraite plus de 150 pasteurs chaque année et ce nombre va bientôt monter en flèche.

Qu'est-ce que cela signifie pour la Fédération des Maritimes? Cela signifie qu'il sera de plus en plus difficile de combler le vide à mesure que l'écart entre les diplômés et les retraités augmentera. Cela signifie aussi que les Fédérations qui pourraient avoir plus de moyens pour payer les salaires et aussi les plus petits districts (avec moins d'églises) pourront attirer nos pasteurs dans leur direction. C'est une réalité à laquelle nous devrons faire face dans un avenir très proche. Cela pourrait même signifier que certains de nos districts compteront 5 églises par pasteur, à moins que nous n'envoyions plus de jeunes à l'Université Burman (Alberta) pour obtenir un diplôme en pastorat ou en éducation.

Il y a certaines choses vers lesquelles nous devons nous diriger dans notre petite Fédération alors que cette réalité se profile au-dessus de nos têtes. Premièrement, toutes nos églises peuvent devenir davantage gouvernées par des laïques et moins dépendantes des pasteurs et, bien sûr, c'est facile à dire mais très difficile à réaliser. Deuxièmement, nous pouvons travailler plus étroitement avec nos Églises sœurs afin d'accomplir l'évangélisation dans nos centres urbains. Troisièmement, nous pouvons encourager et aider financièrement ceux qui entendent l'appel au ministère dans l'enseignement ou le pastorat.

Une partie de la vision de notre conseil d'administration est d'amener nos églises à être moins dépendantes des pasteurs. J'ai entendu de beaucoup de membres d'église qu'ils veulent juste qu'un pasteur prêche un sermon dans leur église le sabbat matin et aussi diriger la réunion de prière. Je crois, quand j'entends cela, que nous manquons la mission pour laquelle Dieu a mis notre église à part. Notre mission est de chercher et de sauver les perdus et, d'une manière ou d'une autre, avoir un service religieux a supplanté le besoin d'apporter l'Evangile éternel au monde. Si nous nous recentrons et devenons plus comme l'Église primitive, je crois que cette transition peut avoir lieu pour atteindre les

Recently, I met with one of our pastors to talk about progress in his district. His words that he spoke voiced the same concern all of our other pastors have voiced at some time in serving in the Maritime Conference. The concern goes like this. I have small churches that lack gifts, but if our district joined together, they could use their gifts together to have an impact in one of the urban centers. Right now they are stretched too thin. Another concern is that many of our churches are located in barren areas and have had little evangelism impact in the last 10 years. How do we refocus our attention to seek and save the lost in our urban centers? Ellen White encouraged us to have our institutions out in the country and our churches in the city, but we seemed to have reversed this counsel.

The last item I would love to highlight is that we desperately need youth to look at filling the void of our retiring pastors and teachers. We need more youth and young adults to prayerfully consider serving the Lord in pastoral or teaching ministries. You can do your part in encouraging, supporting and praying for our youth and young adults. The Lord needs to impress the need on those that can pick up the call to enter into ministry. As a church, we can all corporately begin to pray that more of our own youth will truly consider following the call of God.

One last note to ponder before you go onto the next article. This past Campmeeting was an awesome experience, if you were there. The clear message of Jesus was presented in such a powerful and meaningful way. If you were there, how are you going to share this great message of Hope that we have in Jesus Christ? If you were not there, please go to the Maritime Conference website and listen to every presentation that is posted. Then, listen to it all over again and let it sink deeply into your heart and mind. When this message of Christ our Righteousness starts to move our hearts and our character starts to resemble the Character of Christ, God will finally have a people that will herald a clear message that the world has never heard before.

This past year we have been focusing on preparing the soil in our communities and learning the names of the people in them. This coming year we are going to begin the awesome task and privilege to share the Everlasting Gospel in our communities. Please begin praying for this momentous task ahead of us in 2020. We will be working with various ministries across North America in order to have a mighty reaping for next year.

Récemment, j'ai rencontré un de nos pasteurs pour parler des progrès réalisés dans son district. Les mots qu'il a prononcés exprimaient la même préoccupation que tous nos autres pasteurs ont exprimé à un moment ou à un autre de leur service dans la Fédération des Maritimes. L'inquiétude est la suivante. J'ai de petites églises qui manquent de dons, mais si notre district s'unissait, elles pourraient utiliser leurs dons ensemble pour avoir un impact dans un des centres urbains. À l'heure actuelle, leur capacité est utilisée au maximum. Une autre préoccupation est que beaucoup de nos églises sont situées dans des zones peu peuplées et ont eu peu d'impact sur l'évangélisation au cours des 10 dernières années. Comment recentrer notre attention sur la recherche et le sauvetage des perdus dans nos centres urbains? Ellen White nous a encouragés à avoir nos institutions à la campagne et nos églises dans la ville, mais nous semblons avoir renversé ce conseil.

Le dernier point que j'aimerais souligner est que nous avons désespérément besoin que les jeunes cherchent à combler le vide de nos pasteurs et enseignants qui prennent leur retraite. Nous avons besoin de plus de jeunes et de jeunes adultes pour envisager, dans la prière, de servir le Seigneur dans des ministères pastoraux ou d'enseignement. Vous pouvez faire votre part pour encourager, soutenir et prier pour nos jeunes et nos jeunes adultes. Paul Llewellyn, Président Conférence Maritime Translation par Guy Lacourse Francis Chan captured it pretty well when he said,

"Church today has become predictable... You go to a building, someone gives you a bulletin, you sit in a chair, you sing a few songs, a guy delivers, maybe, a polished message, maybe not, someone sings a solo, you go home... is this all God intended for us?

Let me frame it this way: Where in the NT do you find instructions on when the church should meet? Or how many songs to sing? Or whether there should be a platform party at the front or not? Or whether we should sit in rows or tables? Where in the NT do we see people stressed out with questions like: Is the program running smooth? Is the song service running too long? Have the details been organized well? Is the bulletin accurate? Did we miss an announcement? Was the special item good? Was the preacher inspiring?

Now none of that is inherently bad. There is nothing wrong with being organized, that's biblical. The problem is we spend all our energy doing what God has never spoken about and have little time to do what he has. In fact, I have been to churches where they haven't reached a soul for ten years (which God commanded us to do) and no one seems fussed. But you touch one detail in the program and it's an all-out war! It's like "Yes! We will die for what God has not spoken about, while ignoring the clear commands he has given us.""

Francis Chan a bien saisi notre situation quand il a dit,

« L'église aujourd'hui est devenue prévisible... Vous allez dans un immeuble, quelqu'un vous donne un bulletin, vous vous asseyez sur une chaise, vous chantez quelques chansons, un gars livre, peut-être, un message poli, peut-être pas, quelqu'un chante un solo, vous rentrez chez vous... est-ce tout ce à quoi Dieu nous a destiné?

Laissez-moi vous expliquer la chose comme ceci: Où, dans le N.T., trouvez-vous des instructions sur le moment où l'église devrait se réunir? Ou combien de chansons chanter? Ou s'il devrait y avoir une troupe de gens prenant place sur une plateforme à l'avant? Ou si nous devrions nous asseoir en rangées ou à des tables? Où dans le N.T. voit-on des gens préoccupés par des questions telle que: Le programme se déroule-t-il bien? Le service de louange est-il trop long? Les détails ont-ils été bien organisés? Le bulletin est-il exact? A-t-on raté une annonce? Le chant spécial était-il bon? Le prédicateur était-il une source d'inspiration?

Maintenant, rien de tout cela n'est mauvais en soi. Il n'y a rien de mal à être organisé, c'est biblique. Le problème est que nous dépensons toute notre énergie à faire ce dont Dieu n'a jamais parlé et que nous avons peu de temps pour faire ce qu'il a dit. En fait, je suis allé dans des églises où ils n'ont pas atteint une âme depuis dix ans (alors que Dieu nous a ordonné de faire des disciples) et personne ne semble s'en soucier. Mais si vous touchez à un détail du programme, c'est une guerre ouverte! « Oui, nous allons jusqu'à mourrir pour ce dont Dieu n'a pas parlé, tout en ignorant les ordres clairs qu'il nous a donnés. »

As the Mission-driven Excellence

(MdX)/REACH Representative for our Conference under my Secretariat hat, this article was spurred on by a Zoom meeting I was recently a part of with three of our four MdX Pilot Pastors and Dr. Paul Brantley, the NAD Strategic Vice-President. Spoiler alert for the end of my article — YOU are the difference in the ministry and message of the Gospel. Christ will accomplish His work, but wouldn't it be so nice to know that He used YOU; little, insignificant YOU (whose worth is beyond measure to Him, Psalms 8:4-5); weak, feeble YOU (but His strength is perfect in our weakness, 2 Corinthians 12:9-10); deceitfully hearted YOU (but God knows our heart, Jeremiah 17: 9-10); poor, blind, naked YOU (whose Father gives gold from the refiner's fire and white garments and eye salve, Revelation 3:17-18). What an opportunity to SHINE, YOU have that opportunity to SHINE as HE SHINES THROUGH YOU! But let's break it down...

In the wake of Hurricane Dorian, the Bahamas is left devastated by a Category 5 Natural Disaster. "About 70,000 Bahamas residents are in immediate need of food and shelter, the UN says." (BBC News) What does the response efforts look like for a situation such as this? First Responders are needed on the scene to sustain the injured and revitalize the dying.



Next, come those who clear the debris, as the rubble makes it impossible for restoration. *And finally, is the call to rebuild that which was lost*. Should it not be the same with our local churches? Is this not the process of habitual reevaluation according to the Acts Church Biblical model we all should follow?

"...Jerusalem lies in waste...." (Nehemiah 2:17) A call to rebuild with an unstoppable strategy propelled Nehemiah in the face of adversity. "The difficulties that God's servants will meet as they move...are but a repetition of the difficulties that Nehemiah met when trying to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem. Every possible hindrance was thrown in his way, and at times his work was almost stopped. But the Lord heard his prayers, and opened the way for his work to go forward" (EGW, Volume 18, Lt 139, 1903, par. 6).

Alonzo T. Jones was an Adventist forefather who triumphed the message of Christ our Righteousness. Despite Jones' alignment with Kellogg in the latter years of his life, it is documented that he remained true to Adventist Beliefs and Doctrines until his death in 1923. He coined the visionary idea that 'individuals reform and institutions don't.' The simplicity of this statement speaks to the individual as the key to establishing healthy churches.

From the pen of Stephen Nelson Haskell (early SDA writer) as he speaks about the importance of the 'individual' in the work of Salvation for our world in his book, *The Cross and Its Shadow*. The individual's light is modelled in the Candlestick of the Sanctuary...and our luminescence before man is a reflection of Christ's shining example:

Whenever an individual will fulfil in his very soul the antitype of the typical "whole" burnt-offering, that is, wholly surrender himself to God, place himself and all he has upon the altar, to be consumed in God's service as He directs, that individual, whether he be rich or poor, learned or ignorant, will be covered with the fragrant incense of Christ's righteousness, and his name will be enrolled with the church of the first-born in heaven; and here in this sin-cursed earth, as he goes to and fro, he will be a part of the great candlestick, and from his life will shine out the bright rays of the Spirit of God.

The question may arise in many hearts, how may I become a light-bearer in the earth? When Zerubbabel was trying under very adverse circumstances to rebuild the temple in Jerusalem, he came to a time when the difficulties appeared like mountains before him. Then the Lord sent His prophet with a message to help and encourage him. Zechariah was given a view of the golden candlesticks, and was also shown whence the oil came that supplied the lamps. He saw two olive-trees, one on the right side of the bowl and the other on the left side, which through golden pipes kept the lamps supplied with oil, that they might burn brightly. Zechariah 4:1-14 The prophet asked the angel the meaning of what he saw. In reply the angel said: "This is the word of the Lord unto Zerubbabel, saying, Not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit, saith the Lord of hosts." Then he gave a message to Zerubbabel to go forward, and said that the mountain of difficulties would become a plain before him, and that as surely as his hands had laid the foundations of the house of the Lord, so surely would he finish it.

Zerubbabel was walking by faith in the words of the prophets who had foretold how and when, Jerusalem would be rebuilt; 2 Chronicles 36:20-23, Jeremiah 25:12, Hosea 1:7. But those prophets were dead, and he now faced difficulties that he might be tempted to think the prophets never expected would arise. Then God sent a living prophet with a message of encouragement, to keep the light burning, and enable Zerubbabel to press forward and complete the work prophesied of by the dead prophets.

We cannot comprehend the word of the Lord without the Spirit to enlighten our minds. The light shines to the degree in which we take the word and risk our all upon it: and as we come into difficulties in following out the instruction given through the dead prophets, the Lord sends messages of strength and encouragement through the living prophet, to enable us to press forward to victory.

"These are the two sons of oil (light-givers), that stand by the Lord of the whole earth." It is the Spirit of God accompanying the word which has been committed to the people, that will give light. Whatever the prophets of God have revealed to man in the past, is light; and those who have adhered strictly to the testimony of God by His prophets, although it may be hundreds of years after the testimony was given, are spoken of favorably by the living prophet, as Zechariah spoke to Zerubbabel (CIS 52.3-CIS 54.1).

Wow! YOU are the church, the building is not the church, the building is not the beacon of light to a darkened world, but YOUR Christian life is a testament before the universe through all Ages of the CHRIST who lives in YOU and the WORD of TRUTH YOU IMPART.

It appears that as the world accepts, we accept. There is relatively little distinction between the Adventist home and the worldly home. We are reluctant, dare I say, scared to raise them with distinction; with the understanding that in this home we serve the Lord and as such, cartoons that depict parents as buffoons or Disney magic or technology as a play phenomenon or popular music beating into their souls and minds or Minecraft or Harry Potter or Fortnite or any/all Superhero movies or Netflix shows/movies with anthropomorphic animals or etc. (oh yes, I'll get specific) is carte blanche for the modern family home today. And we wonder why we have disrespectful teens, rebellious youth and disengaged young adults in the message and mission of the Adventist Church and/or the Kingdom of Heaven.

Treasury Report Ed Sharpe, Treasurer

As of July 31, 2019 our expenses exceed our income by \$261,732 compared with \$310,481 last year.

This is a normal figure for this time of year, just near the end of our busy summer camp program, and will not begin to improve until October.

Our tithe is at \$999,064, \$27,000 ahead of last year.

Jeffrey K. Wilson, with Adventist World Radio, shared the following story:

Alfred Bernhard Nobel (1833-1896), the inventor of dynamite, would eventually hold 355 patents and control 90 factories on five continents. When his brother, Ludvig, died in 1888, a French newspaper mistook him for Alfred and published a cynical obituary, calling him "the merchant of death."

The newspaper's obituary described a man who had gotten rich by helping people kill one another in unprecedented numbers. Feeling the sting, Nobel became obsessed with changing his legacy.

So, in November 1895, he wrote his final will in Paris. He decreed that his estate "shall be dealt with in safe securities and shall constitute a fund, the interest on which shall be annually distributed in the form of prizes to those who...shall have conferred the greatest benefit on mankind."

Alfred Nobel managed to change his legacy in this world. We have a far more strategic opportunity: to change or confirm our legacy in the world to come!"




CONFERENCE-WIDE PRAYER TOPIC

For a long time, I hadn't really paid attention to how I addressed God when I prayed. Maybe I felt as though I was looking up at the sky, sending my hopes and requests out into a misty universe. Other times my focus was more inward, toward a Holy Spirit abiding somewhere between my chest and brain. But today, Jesus was simply a friend on my couch.

"I'll take care of the babysitting," He said.

In three days, I would be giving a speech at a local Mother's Day event, and I really wanted my husband to be there. All of our usual babysitters were busy. When we hear the biblical stories of God whispering to Samuel in the night or coming in the quiet after the earth-quake to speak to Elijah, we believe that God communicates gently, out of the silences. But how do we know what to trust? Those silences can echo with confusion.

For me, trusting that Jesus spoke something so practical to me that early morning was a leap across Niagara Falls.

Please join me as I lean back into Aunt Trudy's soft lap. "Is that really you? Because what you're saying

is the perfect answer to my need; it sounds too good to be true. What if I'm just putting words in Your mouth? What if it's just me, wanting what I want?"

"I'll take care of it."

There was something real at stake here, and it wasn't so much Rob's presence at my speech as, "Do I know God's voice or not? How do I trust that I know?" "So what exactly do You mean? You'll take care of it, as in, I can completely relax? Or You'll take care of it by blessing my efforts? You don't usually work in magic."

But the assurance persisted.

Take the grappling above and play it on repeat over the next 24 hours. Add in a few telephone calls to my baby-sitters AGAIN (in the hopes that Jesus meant they had changed their minds), and a few calls to other contacts they threw out to me, and now another night and I'm awake on an early Saturday morning, holed up in the bathroom.

I don't have a babysitter. Jesus has not taken care of it, that I can see—yet. My earnest efforts at prayer and trusting have ended up here, in a heap on the bathroom floor. I can't make head nor tails of what to do. My computer, open to a professional babysitters' bulletin board, is taunting me. I am wrestling, pinning down a thought, arguing it away, grasping at it again, stuck. How do you KNOW that you've heard God's direction? How do you KNOW that you know?

I switch off the lights and slog back to bed. I need to talk to someone, to Rob. I slide Faith

between the sheets just as two little feet cross our room and a blonde mop top peers over the side of our bed, his signature morning grin spreading like a sunrise.

"Get in!" I say, gesturing with my head as I hold open the quilt. He climbs over me and in between Rob and I, pulling the blanket up to his chin and snuggling down.

"Can I share something with you?" I ask Rob, over my son's head.

He is just blinking awake, dreading, I'm sure, the tone in my voice, which augurs a serious conversation while his brain cells are barely firing.

"What do I do?" I ask, after the tearful summary. Rob is gracious. "That's hard," he said.

My five-year-old is looking at my face, which is wet with the tears of my struggle. I wanted to hear, and at the same time didn't want to be foolish. Our boy doesn't understand what we're talking about, but he sees my anguish, and his eyes are troubled.

Into the sniffling silence, he begins to sing, his morning voice clearing out into a sweet soprano. The words to a song we had played often in the car come sailing out of his lips, draping themselves over me like a silk scarf, smoothing my brow, transforming my tears into breathlessness at the grace:

"Take no thought for tomorrow, for tomorrow will take care of itself. Your heavenly Father knows what you need, so take no thought for tomorrow."

That was from our son, our little boy.



All the poundage fell to the floor, rebounding a moment before coming to stillness. His grin returned as he watched the rainbow come out—smile amidst tears.

The next morning, a friend called and asked if she could bring my daughter to a birthday party for most of the day. Rob took care of the other two and brought them all to watch my speech. There was an ease to it all. Jesus took care of it.

I could have relaxed all those days, chilled out, like Jesus in the prow of the boat in the storm.

But I didn't know it until I lived it out, all the way to the end of my struggle.

We were listening to this song again, "Take no thought for tomorrow," at the hospital a few days ago as I cut Rob's hair. He has another infection, a microbe that you have in your armpits but he has in his tracheo-bronchial tubes...it's zonking him out. We opted to do an inhaled antibiotic this time. How do you take no thought for tomorrow when your tomorrow feels depressing and unknown, when the present moment doesn't tell you your future? How do you make that leap?

"Your heavenly Father knows what you need..."
Yes. Let go of the thoughts and the fears about tomorrow. He knows what we need, and He will give us what we need, for today, for the present moment. Oh, beautiful, divine invitation to rest and relax and snuggle with the soft-skinned boy singing sweetly next to you. Rest. Rest in the care that we've seen so many times in the past.

He will take care of it.
