Change

The year we dropped our daughter off to begin her first year at Parkview Adventist Academy was when it all began. The drive back home seemed extra-long and Cyndi and I realized that our home, as we once knew it, would

never be the same again. A change had begun, a new "normal" as it were.

It wasn't that the change was bad, but it was new, it was different, and to be honest, we weren't sure how to enter this new normal. We knew it was the best thing for her, and we realized rather quickly that to get through this, we would have to trust God to take care of her. It wasn't that we hadn't been trusting God to do this anyway, but now she was 1400 km away.

This was difficult for us because that was "our" job and we didn't feel ready to relinquish that responsibility yet. God was so good to us by providing a special person, Verla Matacio, who was the dean in the dorm. She showed love and care for our daughter, giving her the same guidance and advice that we would have given her ourselves. The metamorphosis had begun.

The change was still not easy, as change rarely is. However, we survived and so did our daughter. In fact, I would say we all came out stronger because of the change. Sometimes in order to face change, we need to fully embrace it.

Years later, we were about to see another change. This was going to be another metamorphosis that no one had ever seen or experienced before. In the beginning of March, there was talk of a virus that was in China. The virus was just a blip on the radar at that time. Something that was in another part of the world. Never in a million years would I have guessed the change that was about to happen to our world. Three weeks later, churches were being closed down. Change was happening, and the metamorphosis was just beginning.

Le changement.

C'est l'année où nous avons déposé notre fille pour commencer sa première année à l'Académie adventiste de Parkview que tout a commencé. Le chemin du retour nous a semblé très long et Cyndi et moi avons réalisé que notre maison, telle que nous l'avions connue, ne serait plus jamais la même. Un changement avait commencé, une nouvelle "normalité" pour ainsi dire.

Ce n'est pas que le changement était mauvais, mais il était nouveau, il était différent, et pour être honnête, nous ne savions pas comment entrer dans cette nouvelle normalité. Nous savions que c'était la meilleure chose à faire pour elle, et nous avons réalisé assez rapidement que pour passer au travers, nous devions faire confiance à Dieu pour prendre soin d'elle. Ce n'est pas que nous n'avions pas fait confiance à Dieu de toute façon, mais maintenant elle était à 1400 km.

C'était difficile pour nous car c'était « notre » travail et nous ne nous sentions pas encore prêts à abandonner cette responsabilité. Dieu a été si bon pour nous en nous accordant une personne spéciale, Verla Matacio, qui était la doyenne du dortoir. Elle a fait preuve d'amour et d'attention envers notre fille, en lui donnant les mêmes conseils et orientations que nous lui aurions donnés nousmêmes. La métamorphose avait commencé.

Le changement n'était pas encore facile, comme c'est rarement le cas. Cependant, nous avons survécu et notre fille aussi. En fait, je dirais que nous en sommes tous sortis plus forts grâce au changement. Parfois, pour faire face au changement, nous devons l'accepter pleinement.

Des années plus tard, nous étions sur le point de voir un autre changement. Il allait s'agir d'une nouvelle métamorphose que personne n'avait jamais vue ou expérimentée auparavant. Début mars, on parlait d'un virus qui se trouvait en Chine. Le virus n'était alors qu'un spot sur le radar. Quelque chose qui se trouvait dans une autre partie du monde. Jamais, en un million d'années, je n'aurais deviné le changement qui allait se produire dans notre monde. Trois semaines plus tard, les églises étaient fermées. Le changement se produisait, et la métamorphose ne faisait que commencer.

Change.

Is it good? Is it bad? Should we embrace it? Should we fight it?

Ecclesiastes 3 starts out by telling us that there is a time for everything under the sun. Maybe this is the time to really evaluate how we have been carrying out church in the past. Is this the way we want church to look like in the future? If we have learned anything at all from COVID-19, we have learned that we *can* do things differently. There are several things we would have never seen or heard in 2019:

- If you are wearing a mask, then you can use 1 meter to social distance.
- We will no longer be taking up the offering. Please use online giving.
- We will no longer shake hands while greeting people.
- Until further notice we are unable to do hospital visitations.
- Until further notice we will not be meeting in person, but online through zoom.

Change.

Ghandi is credited with saying, "Be the change you want to see in the world." Essentially speaking, because of COVID-19, we have an opportunity to try and do things differently. How do we want to see the gospel move forward? Are we open to trying new things? *Sometimes in order to face change, we need to fully embrace it.*

In <u>Testimonies to the Church</u>, Volume 6, Ellen White says this:

New methods and new plans will spring from new circumstances. New thoughts will come with new workers who give themselves to the work.... They will receive plans devised by the Lord Himself.

As followers of Jesus, what new methods and plans are we making from our new circumstances? This was supposed to be our year of Evangelism. However, because of COVID-19, we have spent most of this year trying to figure out how to operate our churches in these extenuating circumstances. For now, most of our churches have figured out what their church services are going to look like until the next change comes in.

Est-ce que c'est bon? Est-ce que c'est mauvais?
Devrions-nous l'accepter? Devrions-nous le combattre?
Ecclésiaste 3 commence par nous dire qu'il y a un temps pour tout sous le soleil. C'est peut-être le moment d'évaluer réellement la façon dont nous avons mené l'église dans le passé. Est-ce à cela que nous voulons que l'église ressemble dans l'avenir? Si nous avons appris quelque chose de COVID-19, c'est que nous pouvons faire les choses différemment. Il y a plusieurs choses que nous n'aurions jamais vues ou entendues en 2019:

- Si vous portez un masque, alors vous pouvez utiliser seulement un mètre de distance sociale.
- Nous ne ramasserons plus les offrandes. Veuillez utiliser le don en ligne.
- Nous ne serrerons plus la main aux gens pour les saluer.
- Jusqu'à nouvel ordre, nous ne pouvons plus effectuer de visites à l'hôpital.
- Jusqu'à nouvel ordre, nous ne nous rencontrerons pas en personne, mais en ligne grâce au zoom.

Le changement.

On attribue à Gandhi le mérite d'avoir dit: « Soyez le changement que vous voulez voir dans le monde. » Pour l'essentiel, grâce à COVID-19, nous avons la possibilité d'essayer de faire les choses différemment. Comment voulons-nous voir l'évangile progresser? Sommes-nous ouverts à essayer de nouvelles choses? Parfois, pour faire face au changement, nous devons l'accepter pleinement.

Dans Testimonies to the Church, volume 6, Ellen White dit ceci:

De nouvelles méthodes et de nouveaux plans vont naître de nouvelles circonstances. De nouvelles pensées viendront avec de nouveaux travailleurs qui se donneront au travail... Ils recevront des plans conçus par le Seigneur lui-même.

En tant que disciples de Jésus, quels sont les nouvelles méthodes et les nouveaux plans que nous élaborons à partir de nos nouvelles circonstances? Cette année devait être notre année d'évangélisation. Cependant, à cause de COVID-19, nous avons passé la majeure partie de cette année à essayer de trouver comment faire fonctionner nos églises dans ces circonstances exténuantes. Pour l'instant, la plupart de nos églises ont compris à quoi ressembleront leurs services religieux en attendant le prochain changement.

The metamorphosis continues.

I would like to encourage each of you to prayerfully try to find a way to represent Christ to your neighbors as this pandemic continues. Our current Sabbath School lessons couldn't be timelier. "Making Friends for God" is what we have all been asked to do. Jesus gave us an assignment. He tells us about it in Mark 16:15 (NLT): And then he told them, "Go into all the world and preach the Good News to everyone."

The Maritime Conference is still in the middle of a pandemic. We are living in a community where there is pain and suffering all around us. It's easy to get caught up in the negativity. God specifically tells us to give thanks in all things. It's time to stop focusing on all the restrictions and the negative changes COVID-19 has brought. Instead, let us fall on our knees and ask God to come into our hearts, to share His love, and give us the wisdom and compassion we need to help our hurting neighbors around us. *Sometimes in order to face change, we need to fully embrace it.*

St Francis of Assisi said it well, "Preach the Gospel at all times. If necessary, use words."

A few points to remember over the continued next renewal phases this Fall:

- 1. Spotlight Singing—singing, if at all, should be limited and all participants kept physically distanced within bubbles; mask wearing is required in NS and recommended in NB & PEI, especially for the context of singing, as it greatly decreases the transmittal of spittle and bacteria.
- 2. Church potlucks/events—these are still not deemed to be wide open but very limited in nature. All food should be pre-packaged, picnic-style where there's no cross contamination, or from a restaurant venue with proper food prep procedures in place. Please contact us if you need more specific guidelines.
- 3. Contact Tracing—ensure proper information is collected for each service/event your church holds; see your local governmental expectations.



"God Meant it for Good"

"But as for you, you meant evil against me; but God meant it for good, in order to bring it about as it is this day..." (Genesis 50:20).

When confronted with tragedy or difficulty, there is a natural tendency—by no means does it come easily or quickly—to identify a "silver lining," that optimistic perspective that provides meaning and hope in the midst of trial. Indeed, in every trial of temptation, we can be assured of the promise of 1 Corinthians 10:13 wherein God promises that nothing that touches us does so apart from His grace to overcome. I would like to paint a picture of that silver lining which surrounds the challenges and difficulties that we have faced in the past 6 months.

Just before the school closure in mid-March, SLA teachers were ready to take a much needed break from their labours. Yet with the prospect of a protracted hiatus from learning-as-usual, the radically dedicated staff put the axe to the grindstone, worked like mad throughout the March break, and rolled out a fully online learning program on day 1 after the break. In this, we came out ahead of the public system by 3 ½ weeks. What is more, the sense of unity and fellowship (not to mention collaboration) between staff members who were collectively being stretched and squeezed beyond the usual limits grew immensely. Paraphrasing for the education context, "how good and how pleasant it is for educators to dwell together in unity!" (Psalm 133:1).

Given the spectacular diligence and adaptability of our newly minted online educators, we received a high volume of positive parent feedback and constructive criticism. As our program continued to improve, so did the cheerleading from parents (and even a few students). You may have read some of their comments in the June edition of the Pulse.

An overwhelming majority of parents re-enrolled their children for the 2020-2021 school year, so much so that we came face to face with a very good problem; a waiting list! Such interest in our program seemed to mirror the promise, "Give, and it will be given to you...For with the same measure that you use, it will be measured back to you" (Luke 6:38).

Fast forward a couple of months. A few days into my vacation in Alberta, the Nova Scotia government announced and published its Back to School plan. With the tighter restrictions being placed on space and separation for students, we quickly realized that our classes were far too large in number considering the rather diminutive classroom sizes. As a results, the bold decision to hire another Elementary teacher-this when so many schools are having to lay off teachers—was made so that we could achieve smaller class sizes. With that, we welcomed Mrs. Isabelle Tingley, née Goguen, as our new grade 3/4 teacher. It was only just over 4 years ago when Isabelle graduated from SLA and began her Education studies at Burman University. Now that is Adventist Education at work! Graciously, another one of our new hires-Ms. Shirleen Luttrell (Math)-relocated from her current classroom and took on the task of transforming the computer lab into a semi-private math and home economics classroom. The effort, creativity, and adaptability she brought to this transformation was inspiring to all who witnessed it. In such uncertain and chaotic times as these, it is so important to "be ready in season and out of season" (2 Tim. 4:2).

That brings us to today. We have just completed our first week of school to glowing reviews by both parents and students (and I pray staff as well). We were blessed with glorious weather, allowing for many classes to take place outside (another silver lining). Mr. Scott is on the homestretch of his science class renovation; there was very little downtime for him and Sharri this summer. We welcomed Mrs. Alexandra Dias as our new After School Care supervisor.

Enrollment is up to 78, already surpassing last year's maximum and 12 higher than two years ago. I am happy to report that we genuinely have an excellent crop of staff, students, and parents who are pulling together and thriving in this new and novel learning environment. Only the Lord knows what the rest of this year holds, but we hold fast to the promise that "He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus" (Ph. 1:6).

Challenges still abound. New health and safety rules have resulted in a cascade of requirements and decisions that have significantly increased expenditures. Maintaining our 46-year-old building comes with surprises and expenses at every turn. We are pressed for space to put both our equipment and students; expansion of the building would appear to be a necessity if we continue on this trajectory. Every staff member has had to work much harder in order to comply with the new requirements; they are already so taxed working in a small school such as ours which strives to still do great things.

Please continue to pray for your Maritime educators. These challenges only press us closer to one another as we draw nearer to our Heavenly Father, trusting the promise that He "is able to do exceedingly abundantly above all that we ask or think" (Eph. 3:20). We would welcome any help—be it prayers, donations, ideas, volunteering - that would help us to meet some of these challenges head on and to overcome them.

Our deepest thanks to all of you who continue to labour in your own way to ensure that SLA continues to shine as a light in the Maritimes.

Guide plans to develop two special issues featuring fundamental beliefs each year. In 2021, a bi-monthly column by former editor Randy Fishell will introduce and reinforce key beliefs. Finally, the Guide editorial team is about to release a new book, What We Believe for Guide Readers, which introduces kids to Adventist beliefs through true stories and fun studies.







ADRA Grants Help Canadians Meet COVID-19 Needs

(CANADA) Nearly three dozen Seventh-day Adventist churches and organizations across Canada received grants from the Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA), the church's global humanitarian arm, to expand their community services during the COVID-19 pandemic. ADRA in Canada, the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada and Adventist Community Services of the North American Division, partnered to provide the grants, which are expected to total nearly \$400,000 (CAD), equivalent to \$300,000 (USD).

"With 44 percent of Canadian households reporting lost work due to the coronavirus shutdown, we are seeing unprecedented levels of need across the country," says Daniel Saugh, ADRA programs manager in Canada. "The grants will help churches feed the hungry and minister to people who are hurting during this time of isolation and uncertainty."

The 33 grants awarded so far were used primarily to distribute food and hygiene products. For instance, the Staff of Life Food Bank in Scarborough, Ontario, operated by the Philadelphia Seventh-day Adventist Church, used its ADRA grant to provide clients with personal care kits containing hard-to-find supplies such as toilet paper, disinfectant spray and antibacterial soap.

One grant supplied personal protective equipment to a nursing home, while another purchased tablets for a nursing home so that elderly residents could connect with their families. Three of the grants provided food or mental health support to vulnerable First Nations communities.

"Most people don't think that food banks are on the front line, but we are because we are meeting a need during this crisis," says Cynthia Louis-Smith, director of donor relations for the Parker Street Food and Furniture Bank in Halifax, Nova Scotia, which received a \$25,000 grant to distribute food hampers. "Food banks, including Parker Street, are able to fill that gap because of support from our supporters and organizations, like ADRA."

The grant program has assisted Adventists in showing Jesus' care and compassion to their communities during these difficult times. "We have helped more than 20,000 people and counting across the country in response to the increased needs caused by COVID-19," Saugh says.

ADRA's grants in Canada are part of the organization's global COVID-19 response, which includes aid to approximately 2.7 million families in more than 70 countries. ADRA's emergency relief activities include distributing food, hygiene products and cash vouchers to people in need as well as training frontline workers and providing medical supplies to hospitals serving vulnerable communities.
